

# Directions for Summer Assignment

**\*You can download “Measure for Measure” from the Internet or purchase a copy from any online bookstore.**

**Step 1:** Print a copy of the student handout or download the word document and type in your answers.

**Step 2:** Each graphic organizer needs to be filled out completely.

**Step 3:** When writing your short response, you need to make sure you have completed the following steps:

- After completing the graphic organizers, use the information to help build your response.
- Restate the question and provide an answer.
- Use proper transitions throughout the response.
- Provide your first citation (evidence) from the text to support your answer.
- Provide an explanation of how the evidence supports the thesis in your own words.
- Provide a second citation (evidence) from the text to support your answer.
- Provide an explanation of how the evidence supports the thesis in your own words.
- Provide a closing sentence that mirrors your first sentence.

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**\*A RESEST Guide has been provided for you that expands on the above steps.**

**Step 4:** You will type a final draft of your response using Microsoft Word/Microsoft Word Online. When typing your final draft, you need to make sure you have completed the following steps:

- Font- Times New Roman- Size 12.
- Name and Date typed in the right-hand corner of the document.
- Title the assignment: “Measure for Measure” Tragic Hero Response
- Indent the first line of your response.
- Double space your response.
- Check for errors with capitalization, grammar, punctuation, and spelling before submitting your final draft.
- The printed handout will be turned in to your English teacher at the beginning of the 2024-2025 school year.
- If the printed handout is crumpled, torn, or wrinkled it will not be accepted.

## **Example of Double Spacing:**

The theme of Act V, Scene 3 of Romeo and Juliet is that all-consuming love can lead to your misfortune. According to lines 123-124, Juliet states “Then I’ll be brief. O happy dagger! This is thy sheath; there rust and let me die.” This illustrates that Juliet is willing to take her own life to join Romeo in death. This also illustrates that all-consuming love can lead to your downfall. As shown above, the theme, all-consuming love is shown through the characters Romeo and Juliet.
